 City Park will be a busy place this spring....




Not So Much an Up for the month:

January 2021 vs 2022 Revenue and Attendance



City of Sevierville Bowling Center Center/History and Where are we going from here?





Evolution of Bowling for the last 40 years!

- For many years the typical Bowling Alley as they were called back in the day consisted of organized bowling leagues, neighborhood buddies out for a night of fun, thick cigarette smoke, 7th frame games, and well you get the idea. Bowling Leagues kept the doors open.
- Roughly about 25 years ago things began to change, the new brand became known as a Bowling Centers and a new electronic offering
 called Cosmic Bowling became the new craze and it has not stopped since.
- Bowling by many other activities indoor venues, all of which moved to marketing towards family and corporate functions.
- Over the past ten years, most people just cannot commit to 36 weeks of bowling leagues. League are back and forth, up, and down, which brings us to where we are now in 2022. Today in Sevierville, Bowling Leagues represent only 10% of the total revenues., we see that trend continuing
- That 'quality time' that most people sit aside for recreation gets squeezed these days. Thus, people are fitting fun events like bowling into birthday parties, family reunions, church group outings, school functions, even business gatherings for employees and their families., that is where our future revenues will come from .

History of Our Bowling Equipment

- Our Bowling Center opened on July 21, 1982. When the Bowling Center opened; USED AMF 82-70 machines with 5 board processors were installed. Used bowling equipment was chosen due to budget limitations., although a necessary decision it proved to be problematic. We sent our staff to school to learn how to repair these machines.....that was the best decision we made.
- In the late 1980's our Bowling Center upgraded and replaced the 5 -board processors with a 1 -board microprocessor and the ball returns were upgraded from kicker lift style to positive ball lift system.
- In the early 1990's AMF introduced a new machine called he 90/80 with a new Daisy Chain system that looped the bowling machines into the Daisy effect. We installed these and for a few years and they worked fine and then the weak metal frame flaws begin to appear but of course the warranty had expired. AMF had not stress tested enough, it was like buying a car the first year first came out.
- In 2002 we installed the current Brunswick GSX Nex Gen Bowling Machines. The electronics are operated by a silver box with a CPU board and a High Voltage Board that operated a pair of lanes. Each lane has its own cabling system. operated by electric motors, solenoids, and switches. Ball returns have a separate ball motor that runs a lane pair. Pins are brought up by an elevator system to a setting table. These machines have been very good and durable; but they are now 20 years old and are well used. We have a huge problem getting replacement parts. Circuit Boards are becoming hardest to get because no new circuit boards have been built for several years, we can only get refurbished equipment that has already been rebuilt many times over.
- So here we are in 2022, our Bowling Center will be 40 years old this year.....We need to rebrand our center moving forward making every attempt to provide quality services with excellent equipment and customer satisfaction. We will continue to support a few small leagues, our high school teams, but we are moving towards more birthday parties, church groups, family reunions and corporate outings. We need to keep up with the changing times!
