





Monthly Report March 2019

-Maintenance Staff began the installation of a new permeable surface on Field #5 at City Park under a large Oak Tree. The Oak Tree became huge and the root system created some liability for users. Rather than cut the tree down; Maintenance Supervisor Joe Mattern researched the options and found a product made from old rubber tires that we think will allow us to keep the tree, provide shade and provide a safe walkable surface behind home plate on Field # 5 at City Park. Flexi-Pave is a pour-in-place, rubber paving surface that is pervious to storm water. The rubber used to make Flexi-Pave comes from recycled tires. It's similar to porous pavement but has the advantage of a flexible surface that doesn't crack or develop potholes. It's been used for sidewalks, parking lots and roadways. The cost is approximately \$6 per square foot installed. This area will become the location of the Cheri and Bryan Atchley Tree Memorial Planter Area.



-Preconstruction Meeting for New Roof at Community Center was held on March 28th. Construction is scheduled to begin April 15th and last for (6) six months (October 15th). Let's make it safe for everyone!



For years it has been challenging to enforce Tennessee Law as it relates to smoking in and around both public parks and buildings. Upon in depth research, the Director has determined that there are several laws that allows Cities to set up policy and enforcement that protects both the smoker and non-smoker. Signage and designated covered Smoking Areas were installed in March at both the Community and Civic Centers as well as City Park...

Non-Smoker Protection Act" (Civic Center)

-Smoking is prohibited in the Civic Center; which is a polling place;

reception area, theater, public lobby, and other common-use public areas.

-No Smoking is allowed with 20' of any pubic entrance.

A Covered Designated Smoking Area is provided on the West Side of the

Civic Center on the sidewalk towards City Hall/Police Dept.

-A person who knowingly smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited

will be subject to civil penalty of \$50 dollars

Children's Act for Clean Indoor Air" (Community Center)

-In Tennessee smoking is prohibited in many public places. Smoking is not

Permitted in any room or area of a community center.

-For your convenience a Covered Designated Smoking Area is provided

Outside the front of the Community Center.

-A person who knowingly smokes in an area where smoking is prohibited

And will be subject to a Civil Penalty of Fifty Dollars (\$50)




Community Center:

On a personal note; Roxanne Dehart our Aquatics Supervisor for many years lost her Mother this month, my she RIP.








Bowling




Children's Program Highlights:

Athletic Highlights:


