Ups for the month

- It might not look like it, but progress has been accomplished this month on the Middle Creek Greenway Phase III. The pedestrian bridge must be installed first before the contractor can move forward.
- ⇒Blalocks is schedule to begin construction of the West Prong Greenway on September 3rd.
- ⇒ Met with the Tn. Dept of Health about some possible grants for improvements to our facilities. DOH now has money for Cities for health and recreation related projects.
- The Farmers Market moved to the Municipal Complex this month due to Streetscapes downtown. Our staff will be attempting to get some feedback from the vendors on the entire Farmers Market experience.
- ⇒This month our department assumed the responsibility for cleaning the Community and Civic Centers, mowing and landscaping Ext 407 area and we began offering the Silver Sneakers Program at the Community Center.
- ⇒On the last two pages of this document you will find a report on pickleball and tennis courts having joint use of the courts.


-Not So Much an Up



- ⇒We have begun accepting patrons for the Silver Sneakers Program which is a very good thing. However as with anything new, we need to workout the challenges with the computers talking to each other so that we will get reimbursed.
- On the last day of the season, we had an major accident at the Family Aquatics Center. It did not involve water.. One of our Umbrella's malfunctioned and fell on the head of an eleven year old from the Water Slide. Thank goodness he is going to be ok.
- ⇒This is both a good and not so good thing. We have lots of people that requested to play pickle ball at night. Pickle Ball is played on 1/2 of a tennis court. When we painted the pickle ball court lines on to the tennis courts; some of the tennis courts folks were not pleased. Of course our goal is to serve all.... The picture to the right is how the pickle ball and tennis courts are now multipurpose courts.
- ⇒It has been seven years since we re-did our tennis courts. We cleaned the courts about 6 months ago, but now the surface of the courts are wearing badly and a black soot like material has formed on the courts. We will clean the courts again and look at options. The picture to the right is how a pickle ball and tennis court look together.
- ⇒The sprinkle system at the Community Center malfunctioned this month. As is the building, the sprinkler system is almost 40 years old.....we are researching options.

Parks and Recreation:

This division also includes Winterfest, Beautification and Trees with the primary goal of this division being to provide overall departmental leadership and support plus providing clean, safe and aesthetically pleasing public areas throughout the City.

- Assumed the mowing and maintenance of the areas around the 407 interstate exit/interchange. Started some beautification efforts with the planting of Crape Myrtles in the median









 Staff Added 2 pickleball courts to court #1 of the tennis courts.



Report on Tennis and Pickle Ball Joint Use of Courts at City Park-September 2019

Tennis History:

- The tennis courts at city park were rebuilt in 2012 with funds coming from: USTA/Sevier County Schools/State of Tennessee/City of Sevierville
- Since that time tennis use has been steady with small groups playing regularly and the School System using the courts for Middle and High School Tennis for several county schools.

Pickle Ball History:

- About a year ago a small group of citizens contacted us about the possibility of playing Pickle Ball on the tennis courts. Pickle ball is the largest growing sport for Seniors in the United States.
- Given that not all (8) eight tennis courts are used often except for school practices and matches, it seemed like a reasonable request.
- That group use remained steady; but then the group created a Facebook Page (Pickle Ball of the Smokies) and the number of players has increased to about 20+/- each week.
- In late August we were contacted by this group about the possibility of painting a Pickle Ball court on one of the Courts under the lights so they could play when it was cooler in the evenings.
- My staff contacted two different public park agencies that have Pickle Ball on Tennis Courts and requested information about joint use of pickle ball and tennis, and they shared their experiences with us
- One recommendation was to paint the lines a bright color. So...we painted our pickle ball lines yellow.

Tennis and Pickle Ball:

- On Tuesday September 3rd during the painting of the pickle ball courts a group of tennis
 players approached one of our Maintenance Employees and verbally expressed their
 displeasure with the him for painting the pickle ball courts on the tennis court. When I was
 notified of the incident; I went to the courts, but the tennis players had left.
- On Thursday morning September 5th I went back to the courts and there were 17 people playing pickle ball and about 12 people playing tennis. There were still three courts not being used by anyone.
- On that same day (September 5^{th)} I spoke with both groups and listened. In summary, the Pickle Ball players were very positive and grateful. I asked them if they were residents, about half were residents and that have lived here only a few years (mostly retired) and about half were tourist. The tourist found this group via the Facebook Page. On the other hand, the tennis players were very negative and quite upset. I attempted to explain our rational, but no matter what I said, they were just not happy about not being able to play on the court of their choice.

Moving Forward:

- We are currently cleaning the courts because of a major buildup of algae, dirt and grim that
 accumulates over time. What we have found is that the courts have worn down to the
 asphalt and we need to consider recoating the courts soon.
- My staff and I are scheduled to meet Baseline Sports; the company that completed the work
 on the courts in 2012. Our goal will be to get both some suggestion for future repairs as well
 as clarify the best paint color to use for the pickle ball courts on the tennis courts.
- We may be headed towards a situation that will require us to go to a scheduling/reservation system; if these two groups cannot work this out among themselves.

On the following page please find two pictures of the people using the courts for both Tennis Courts and Pickle Ball Courts on Thursday September 5, 2019. That day I counted a total of 17 Pickle Ball Players and 12 tennis players that morning and there were still two courts not being used. Staff will continue to monitor the situation.
